



CLIMATEWISE BUSINESS PARTNERS CONTINUE to raise the bar on their commitment to environmental stewardship and economic vitality. In 2013, their collective efforts saved nearly \$15 million and reduced carbon dioxide equivalent (CO,e) emissions by 171,641 tons.

The reduction of 171,641 tons of CO,e is equal to 15 million trees being planted in Fort Collins or a reduction of 2.3 million vehicle round trips between Fort Collins ClimateWise partners have saved 12 billion gallons of water, 819 million kWh of electricty and 19.7 million therms of natural gas. ClimateWise is a voluntary program sponsored by the City reducing their waste, conserving water and energy, and using alternative transportation. Since 2000, partners ranging from small to large organizations have achieved a cumulative savings of more than \$83 million and 1.2 million tons of CO,e, and have diverted more than 684,000 tons of waste from the landfill by reducing, reusing and recycling. of Fort Collins. ClimateWise partners have also achieved cumulative water savings of 12 billion gallons, the same amount of water needed to fill City Park pool 55,000 times. Their cumulative reduction of 819 million kilowatt hours (kWh) of electricity equals the total annual energy use

of 7,500 homes over the same period. Partners have also reduced their natural gas use by 19.7 million therms, or the equivalent natural gas use of 2,100 homes.

Status of bison, bighorn, and feral horses

August 21, 2014

John Muir said, 'When we try to pick out anything by itself, we find it hitched to everything else in the universe.' This talk shares how changing environmental dynamics, such as food sources, affect bison and bighorn herds and feral horses in Rocky Mountain ecosystems.

The Ecosystem Science & Sustainability and Natural Resource Ecology Lab in the Warner College of Natural Resources are hosting, Bison, Bighorn, and Feral Horses: Ungulates in Rocky Mountain Ecosystems.

The event is free and open to the public.

The status of ungulate herbivores


Ungulate herbivores are an integral part of Rocky Mountain ecosystems, and as such, managers need to understand how changing environmental dynamics may limit these large herbivores.

Three studies on Rocky Mountain ungulates will be presented and discussed:

- 1. In a study of bighorn sheep in a designated wilderness area, we used non-invasive genetic markers from feces to determine bighorn sheep abundance and survivorship for a herd that was hypothesized to be declining. We sampled from a small but accessible portion of the population's range and relied on citizen science volunteers to maximize data collection and reduce costs. The method has promise in areas where wilderness character and wilderness values are revered, such as within Rocky Mountain National Park.
- 2. Bison conservation is currently being proposed in the San Luis Valley of Colorado. This cold desert ecosystem is part of the historic range of bison. We studied bison-elk-vegetation interactions to understand the role of bison in this ecosystem, and provide decision-making capacity to resource managers.
- 3. A proposed study of feral horses inhabiting a mountain ecosystem will be presented: Ecological modeling to determine appropriate management level and assess ecological integrity of habitat.

This program is the result of a partnership between Poudre River Public Library District and The Rocky Mountain Environment and Society program in the Natural Resource Ecology Department (NREL) at Colorado State University.

Gun group challenges Windsor library rules

An employee of Rocky Mountain Gun Owners is challenging the Clearview Library District after she was asked to leave a Windsor library for carrying a concealed handgun.

Windsor resident Erika Sattler says she was asked to leave the Windsor Severance Library last Wednesday because she was discovered to be carrying the gun. RMGO, a Windsor-based pro-gun lobbying group, sent a cease and desist letter Friday to the the library district that urges the public organization to review its policy and respect people's right to lawfully carry a concealed weapon.

Clearview Library District would not immediately comment on the incident because the district's director, Ann Kling, is out of town until Wednesday. A library representative confirmed that Sattler was asked to leave, and that the library board plans to discuss its firearm policy Thursday evening at the Windsor Severance Library. The scheduled board meeting starts at 5:30 p.m.

"They can say 'You can not open carry,' but they can't say, "No concealed carrying," National Association for Gun Rights spokeswoman Danielle Thompson said Tuesday afternoon. "They don't have the right."

Sattler was reportedly visiting the library with her children Wednesday when her shirt rode up and exposed she had a gun, Thompson said. Officials at the library asked her to leave; and because she had her children with her, she complied.

The library can ask patrons to refrain from carrying firearms, but stickers and signs prohibiting the practice were not displayed when Sattler was asked to leave, Thompson said.

On the library district's website the code of conduct states: "While in the library please be courteous to others ... and refrain from carrying weapons of any sort except by law enforcement officers."

The letter Sattler and RMGO submitted to the organization states that the district's policy is prohibited by Colorado law. The letter goes on to say that the district has until Thursday after the board meeting to amend library rules, or the group and Sattler will file a lawsuit or other litigation.

The incident was not reported to the Windsor Police Department, according to Chief John Michaels.
