Executive Director's First Three Weeks

I have spent a fair amount of time connecting with the Library Leadership Team (LLT), the library staff, the library community and our community partners. On my first morning at PRPLD, I visited all three locations and re- introduced myself to staff. I have attended multiple story times at all three locations, the 40th birthday party of the Old Town Library (served cake), Day of the Dead Celebration at Old Town Library. I attended a Library Trust monthly meeting and participated in my first LLT meeting.

I have met the following community leaders: Mayor Troxel and Council members Gino Campana and Ray Martinez at the Homeless Awareness Month Proclamation; County Manager Linda Hoffman and Commissioner Lew Gaiter, where the 2017 budget was discussed; this past week I met with City Manager Darin Atteberry; Poudre Schools Superintendent Sandra Smyser; and Fort Collins Downtown Business Association President Jason Dennison.

My first Front Range Library Director's meeting is on November 18th at the Clearview Library.

Strategic Plan

Various members of the LLT have been getting me up to speed on the progress of the 2016-2018 Strategic Plan. One initiative I have approved is moving forward with the Impact Team (under Goal #3—refine the scope of the library's programs, services, and collections around community priorities to develop the most effective response to community needs). The purpose of the Impact Team is to assist and support the development of intentional programs. The Impact Team will create logic models for programs and services. A logic model is a tool used by funders, managers, and evaluators of programs to evaluate the effectiveness of a program.

Strategic Plan actions I need to follow-up on are:

- I need to approve or make suggestions to the recommendation of the LLT on defining what constitutes culturally diverse programs, services and collections, and create a comprehensive plan for years two and three of socially and culturally diverse activities
- How will the Library proceed with the user experience study—whether it will be internal or external
- Approve/amend LLT's definition of effective library partnerships and create a partnership committee to conduct an audit

The position has been posted. Several changes were made to the position description, giving more emphasis for potential candidates, as well as our current branch managers, to customer service and implementation of the library's strategic initiatives.

COLLECTION DEVELOPMENT

Recycling news:

This summer, our book recycling company changed the rules for what items they would take for recycle. By the end of the summer, they dropped book recycling from their services. Staff scrambled to find a new service because last year, we recycled over 44,000 pounds of books. We did not want to start sending them to the landfill.

After much research, we have a new process for recycling. We have contracted with *Green Girl* from Longmont to pick up library discards and donated books that are in good shape. She sends the books on to Homeless and

Women's shelters and charities in Africa. Books that are in bad shape are pulped for recycling. Donated books in good shape that are not needed by the library or Friends of the Library are now being picked up by the *Epilepsy Foundation*.

With the new process, the recycling bins fit in the new enclosed carport at Webster House which reduces the distance staff and Friends have to move materials.

The recycle market for media cases, discs and Playaways changed recently so we were able to recycle 66 boxes that we saved over the last year. We saved 949 pounds of hard plastics and discs from going to the landfill.

So far this year, we have recycled 281 thirty-gallon bags of shredded paper.

the Latinx Heritage Month. Sylvia Garcia also added a beautiful display at Old Town with many resources to celebrate Latinx heritage.

Our main celebration took place at Old Town where community members were co-creators of content. Many community members created tables highlighting their countries of origin and included Honduras, Argentina, Chile, Brasil, México, Paraguay, Venezuela, Perú, Puerto Rico and España.



Ludy Rueda ensured that we had an amazing lineup of performers and voices including music by Aquiles Quiroga, Quetzalcoatl Mexican Dance, Bella Artes Cultural Group, a tango demo and lesson by TANGO.ORG, a puppet show

"Martina, la cucarachita linda" by Julia Velázquez Cross and Jofat Castillo, and Bloco Em Foco Brazilian drums! For this





celebration we had over 250 people attend.

Tova Aragon, Carol Gyger, and Johanna Ulloa Girón were invited to present at the Research Institute for Public Libraries. We provided open hours for people that had questions on evaluation; Johanna Ulloa Girón was part of a panel of experts discussing surveys and their use at public libraries. Lastly the Impact Team presented the work that different teams have achieved around program evaluation. There was a lot of interest around logic models and storytime evaluation.

Our after-school mobile makerspace continues to be an amazing program. Outreach is partnering with Homework Help at the Fullana. There are

approximately 18 students in attendance and with the guidance of Kathie Young de Herrera, are learning sewing skills by making pillow cases. The majority of the students are boys, with only one or two girls. Not only have they learned how to sew a straight line; they can also make a "hot dog" casing.







Outreach participated at the Poudre School District Parent Academy where we promoted all the great services the District provides for our families. We were also invited to present on reading acquisition for Spanish speaking

parents. Our talented Kathie Young de Herrera presented different techniques to engage children at different developmental stages with reading.

Johanna Ulloa Girón, as a member of the Community Equity Initiative, participated in the strategic planning retreat at the Poudre Fire Authority where the conversation focused on how to fulfill its mission of being a "catalyst to inspire deeper dialogue and raise awareness, committed to facilitating action in support of diversity, equity and inclusion in our community". The Initiative has representatives from CSU, Poudre Fire Authority, Poudre School District, City of Fort Collins, Interfaith group, Vida Sana, Department of Human Services, and Fort Collins Police Services among others. Collectively this group has extensive years of experience working on diversity and equity.



Ludy Rueda and Kathie Young de Herrera gave a tour of Old Town Library to 90 children with their parents from Irish Elementary. Ninety new library cardholders left our building with smiles and books.



Karol de Rueda made a request to Ridgen Farm Senior Living Center to add an iMac introductory class to her regular classes. Their computer lab is Mac and many residents have asked for help since they are not familiar with Macs. The classes were very successful and the residents were surprised about how easy and reliable Mac computers are in general and how their mouse works as a computer itself, not to mention how beautiful their image quality is, never having to worry about viruses and the like.

In partnership with the Human Relations Commission we hosted the last Diversity Forum of the year: From Dystopia to Utopia. With assistance from Teen Librarian, Diane Tuccillo, Sylvia Garcia

gathered books for a display table at this program. She also created bookmarks for program attendees to be able to take and refer to later. It provided a link to additional new and current recommended reads on the topic that I added to our web page Reader's Café. https://read.poudrelibraries.org/books/

Sylvia Garcia presented at Red Tail Ponds Permanent Supportive Housing. Red Tail Ponds is a mixed-income Permanent Supportive Housing site that combines supportive services to formerly homeless people with disabilities and veterans experiencing homelessness. Red Tail Connect is an event for local service providers to interact with residents and to connect those residents with services. This year, along with information about our library programs and collections, Sylvia Garcia emphasized our downloadable products like Hoopla. Especially popular were the bookmarks Old Town Library Lab Assistants made on the 3D printer. Many folks were surprised to learn that they too could have 3D items created for them rather inexpensively. I engaged directly with 35 residents and over 20 local non-profit organizations.

Books By Mail: Homebound patrons who are unable to come into a library branch and do not have someone who can pick up their library items for them may participate in the Books By Mail program. Sylvia Garcia continues to coordinate this program although currently we are not accepting new participants.

Johanna Ulloa Girón, Tova Aragon, and Brendan Haggerty Tungate, Field Education Program, Director from Colorado State University presented at CAL about the MSW Internship at Old Town Library. We discussed the lessons learned from the first placement, the future of the MSW internships at public libraries, and provided specific examples of the impact of having at MSW in the building has had.

We finished the month with the yearly Harry Potter Event at



Northside Aztlan. We set up as the evil bookstore "Obcurous Books" and brought the green screen, iPads with different backgrounds, many books, our calendar, promotions and the always super

popular 3D printer. It was the busiest year yet and all night long we had a long line waiting for us! Special thanks to our

amazing Communication Department and Becky Sheller for the wonderful poster and Harry Potter reading list.




COUNCIL TREE LIBRARY HIGHLIGHTS

DART, October 10-16: For the third and final sample week of 2016, I coordinated staff's recording of public – staff transactions using the DART reference tracker. Public service staff uses DART, a free, web-based tool that provides an electronic system for reporting, tracking and analyzing a library's information transactions, three times per year.

Each "DART week" provides a sample of data showing transactions (questions asked and answered), sortable by





building, location within the building, question type, and duration.

During the October DART week, staff engaged in over 5,000 transactions.

Disaster and Emergency Response Training Committee Meeting, October 19: I facilitated visits from Chris Wolf, Poudre Fire Authority Department of Emergency Management, and Jim Byrne, Fort Collins Police Department to our committee meeting on Oct 19. The committee was impressed by Mr. Wolf and Lt. Byrne's knowledge of emergency management, training organizations (such as PSD and UC Health), and their interest in training library staff in the early spring.

Connecting the Dots Between Play and Learning:

On Tuesday, October 25th, Vicky Hays, Kathie Young-deHerrera, and Jenny Thurman attended a guest lecture and training in Denver. The University of Denver's Marsico Institute for Early Learning and Literacy presented the program. Dr. Stephanie Carlson gave the keynote, which included information about how play fosters executive function skills, especially in young children, as well as explanations of some of the studies that Dr. Carlson and others have conducted on this topic.

October Programs at CTL

Lego ABC:

On Sunday, October 2nd from 2 to 4 pm PRPLD's Lego



Assemble, Build, Create was held for the first time at Council Tree Library. Erin Lucero planned the event and Jenny Thurman hosted. The event was attended by 31 children and 21 adults. This month, participants were encouraged to make



pyramids – or other creations inspired by Ancient Egypt – and were given "treasures" (puffy stickers) to hide in their pyramids. (Each month focuses on a particular challenge, although children are welcome to build and play however

they like.) Many of the children were reluctant to leave their creations behind and all were

eager to show parents and staff what they had built.

Children were also given an opportunity during the event to learn how to program the PRPLD's KIBO robot, which uses 3 dimensional command blocks (containing instructions such as "shake" and "forward") to tell a small robot on wheels what to do.



Teen IRS

On Saturday, October 8th from 11 am - 1 pm, 16 teens and tweens attended the October meeting of the Interesting Reader Society. In addition to regular business and book sharing, teens also played a guessing game in which they wrote down the name of a character or famous person onto a sticky note, exchanged

sticky notes, placed them on their forehead (without looking), and had to ask yes or no questions in order to figure out who was written on their forehead.

Council Tree Book Club: October 10th at 7 pm, CTL LA Karen Cagle coordinated the CTL Book Club's discussion of *The Return of the Dancing Master* by Henning Mankell. Twenty-one adults attended.

Rocky Mountain Raptors: October 12th 6:30 pm The Rocky Mountain Raptors presented Myths, Legends, and Folklore of Owls. Fifty-six patrons of all ages attended.

Food to Fight Cancer: October 17th 6:30 pm, 18 patrons attended this cooking demonstration presented by Sapna von Reich about nutrition choices that can promote health and prevent cancer.

School Liaison Activities

Linton Elementary second grade tours Council Tree Library: On September 30th, Jenny facilitated a tour of CTL for 75 second graders from Linton Elementary. In addition to the tour, students received new library cards, enjoyed a story time, and a scavenger hunt. The classes rotated between the activities and were also given time to read and check-out books.

Preston Middle School Visit, October 7 and 10: Jenny visited three sixth grade technology classes at Preston Middle School to share information about helpful PRPD databases and how to search them. In order to capture the student's attention and encourage them to think about research creatively, I compared research projects to old school video games.

Presentation to Shepardson Elementary: On October 17, Kristen Draper and I gave a presentation on library spaces and design to the second grade classes at Shepardson Elementary. The school is trying a new approach to learning, Problem-Based Learning, where they ask businesses and organizations within the community to share an organizational problem with students. The students then conduct research, draft proposals, and finally present their solutions to business or organization. The students will present their ideas to "solve" the library's problem of space design to the library in December. We realize there is no space to design right now, but the students and school are game anyway!

Virtual tour for Shepardson Elementary, October 27: In order to provide the second graders more information on their library space and design project, I provided a virtual tour to the classes via Google Hangouts. Shepardson's assistant principal and a technology specialist from PSD coordinated the tour and the technology.

Read-a-Thon at Shepardson Elementary: On October 31, in support of the PTO's Read-a-Thon annual fundraiser, I was invited to share stories with a second grade classroom at Shepardson. I am getting to know these kids well!



This presentation was a collaboration with Old Firehouse Books and there were 38 people, teens and adults, in attendance.


From Jennifer Zachman, Children's Librarian

I've been working on a project with Annie Fox to select new furniture for the Harmony children's area which will create a tween space. During the selection and design process, regular tween customers have been sought out to hear their ideas about the space. Currently we're in the design stage of the process.



Harmony hosted the most recent storytime staff meeting. Topics discussed included a review of portions of the Every Child Read to Read initiative, cultural and diversity awareness in storytime including holiday boxes, and a brief overview of storytime resources available at Harmony.






On October 7, Molly and Sarah hosted Social Media for Business and Nonprofits, we had a nice turnout and the program was well received.
