Executive Director's Report March 2014

ADMINISTRATION

Edge Assessment

"The Edge Initiative was developed by a national coalition of leading library and local government organizations, funded by the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation, and led by the Urban Libraries Council. It was created with the vision that all people should have opportunities to enrich and improve their lives through open access to information, communication, and technology services provided by public libraries. Edge is a groundbreaking, first of its kind management and leadership tool, helping libraries create a path for the continuous growth and development of their public technology services." The Library District was invited to participate in the initiative and was part of a national cohort of 40+ peer libraries to take the assessment the first part of this year. Our results will contribute to a national data set that will help libraries across the country compare their results to other libraries of their size. Carol Gyger, Kristen Draper, and I worked with other staff to assess the Library's achievement of the 11 benchmarks, rating ourselves on the indicators for each benchmark.

We completed the on-line assessment on March 31 and immediately received a snapshot of our current technology services. The Library District received a total score of 760 out of a possible 1000 points. I am very happy with this score. We rated very well in benchmarks relating to digital literacy training, public access to electronic content, technology resources to assist patrons in achieving personal goals, building strategic partnerships with community agencies to maximize access to technology resources and encouraging an environment of continuous improvement by sharing expertise and best practices with other library professionals and organizations. Other areas of success include employing and training staff with sufficient technology knowledge and expertise to assist the public and management of our technology resources for maximum quality.

Areas where the Library District can improve are in the development of written management policies for hardware and software replacement, network security and disaster recovery; and developing strategies based on community priorities for digital inclusion and innovation. Our immediate use of this information is for Carol to draft a technology plan for the district. We will also review this information carefully and incorporate new tactics where appropriate into our strategic plan.

Webster House Lease Extension

I am very pleased to report that the Library District has an agreement with the Wilkins Trust to extend the lease of Webster House through July 2015. Kim Seter negotiated with Brad March for several weeks immediately following the March board meeting. The Library District also made a payment in the amount of \$32,666.62, (the amount equal to one year's rent) as a down payment to the purchase price. An agreement was also reached concerning the commission issue.

Tax Increment Financing (TIF) Regional Meeting

As I reported last month, Linda Hoffman, Larimer County Manager, has convened bi- monthly meetings of executive leaders of political entities in Larimer County to discuss the value and use of tax increment financing. The full group (15 city managers, mayors, executive directors of special districts, and school superintendents) met for a second time on March 28. We drafted purpose and goal statements that recognize the value of using TIF as a tool for economic vitality but also recognizes the effects TIF has on the funding of public services. The group will attempt to devise a method to quantify 1) the investment and return for the entity proposing the TIF and 2) the short and long term return on investment of entities from which property tax is redirected. The ultimate goal of these meetings is to adopt agreements as needed among Larimer County entities regarding the process and parameters of future TIF proposals. I have been asked to serve on a sub group that will meet each month to hammer out details of a process/parameters of future TIFs.

One Book for Colorado Day (1Book4CO)

The Library District kicked-off the statewide initiative at Old Town Library on April 5.

One Book 4 Colorado is a statewide initiative envisioned by Lt. Governor Garcia in 2012 to put a book in the hand of every four-year old in Colorado. Public libraries in the state distribute the free copies of the book in English or Spanish to the children through special events, during story times and through outreach efforts. The picture book, *Grumpy Bird*, was selected this year as the give-away. Helping us celebrate OneBook4CO was Senator John Kefalas who read the story in both English and Spanish to over 150 children and their families. Lots of fun activities were planned throughout the day. Senator Kefalas posed for green screen photo op after his reading – see below.



COLLECTION MANAGEMENT

We have loaded MARC records for 106 picture eBooks provided free from the Unite for Literacy project. The project's vision is to create a world of book abundance where all children have access to plenty of books that celebrate their cultures and honor their home languages and promote the joy of reading. At this time, the eBooks are only in English but they hope to add up to 300 languages. Douglas County Library cataloged the items and the Colorado Library Consortium (CLIC) is hosting the digital content. After researching the SkyRiver cataloging system and visiting with Jefferson County's cataloger, it has been decided to move to SkyRiver and drop the OCLC cataloging system. Several studies showed that 93-94% of the records available in OCLC are also available in SkyRiver. For those records that are not available, we have several options. SkyRiver provides an email service for missing records. We let them know we are missing a record and they will email us back when a record is ready. We can also do copy cataloging off of our current WorldCat/Firstsearch database subscription. Because we are an III library and SkyRiver is an III product, records will be automatically updated to show our holdings in SkyRiver. With OCLC, we had extra processes to show our holdings. SkyRiver's interface is very similar to our Discovery catalog interface and the MARC record screen is very similar to what we are using now. There will be very little training time needed. CLIC and III will help with the transition, set up and training. The transition will not affect Interlibrary Loan. They will still be using OCLC. The transition will happen in October.

One plus for changing is that we will be saving money. With the savings in 2014, we will begin laminating the adult paperbacks. Series are becoming very popular again and many have only paperback editions. By laminating the paperbacks, they should last longer in circulation which will cut down on replacement costs but also staff time in reordering popular series. Starting in 2015, there will be approximately \$10,000 in savings to be used for materials.

After a review of processing for the Here and Now Collection, it came to our attention that we are spending money on bookmarks that the patrons don't really pay attention to or they throw them in the trash. After a quick survey of circulation supervisors, it was decided to come up with a new sticker for the front of the items that include the rules of the collection and not have the bookmarks. Paula created a design that could be used on a standard size sticker which saves money and makes removal of the stickers easier for staff. The new stickers debuted on March 17th. We will not be retrofitting the collection so for a while you will see both the new sticker and the old sticker with a bookmark. Tova is gathering comments from staff and patrons and will review in a few months to see if any tweaking of the stickers is needed.

OUTREACH SERVICES

We started a tour to all staff meetings in the three different branches with Council Tree. We presented the following description of all our programs and targeted areas.

- The Poudre River Public Library District Outreach Department strives to create and implement library programs that are inclusive and culturally responsive to traditionally marginalized populations.
- The communities served include those that are geographically isolated from branch services, including individuals economically stressed, communities that are culturally isolated, and those who are underserved due to disability, race, sexual orientation, religion, age, or ethnicity. Services offered include but are not limited to early literacy, digital literacy and resources, bilingual storytimes, storytelling kits for childcare providers, informal lending libraries, mobile makerspaces, citizenships classes, and computer classes.
- The Outreach Department also strives to provide dynamic and engaging volunteer opportunities including Summer Reading Program, Homebound, and Books by mail.
- We are highly involved in the community with any forum or training that promotes assistance to meet the needs of our diverse public. We work very closely with other non-profit organizations, the City of Fort Collins, and Larimer County to better serve our constituents.
- Target Audiences 2014: Gay, Lesbian, Bisexual and Transgender People, Incarcerated People, Older Adults, Immigrant Services, Latino Community, Families and Home bound.

The highlight of the month was the Makerspace at Aztlan Center

We participated in the Hip Hop Expo at Aztlan Center. We used the Green Screen to help a lot of teens learn about the Photoshop App. The event hosted presenters, dancers, and musicians for over 700 teens!!!

On the Road

Throughout the schools we celebrated Dr. Seuss's birthday with digital literacy. The children used the mini iPads to listen to and participate in story time with Dr. Seuss *ABC* and *One Fish Two Fish* apps. Outreach served kids at Stove Prairie, Salud Clinic, Community Life Center, and Teaching Tree, Irish Elementary, and Bauder Elementary too.

We also visited Bethke Elementary and read *Green Eggs and Ham* to Julie Kalvels' kindergarten class. Harris Elementary invited us to present



book talks to their 4th and 5th graders.

Outreach had the first Story Corner at the Masjid (Mosque) and we did a digital story time celebrating



Dr. Seuss. The feedback from the participants was amazing, they expressed being grateful for

the library's services to their community.

Global Village Museum – We started off the month with a story time about India and the colors that we would see. We made "saris" and had lots of fun.

On March 15th Outreach helped in the St. Patrick's Day Parade along with the mascots – pictured on the right. Do you know what they do when they are not at the libraries?

Community Connections

Imaginantes will present a program dedicated to music this year. We have been working arduously to find the best presenters and activities for the teens. So far the Forts Collins Museum of Discovery, Fort Collins Food Bank, The Family Center, Poudre River Friends of the library, and LASSO have agreed to participate.

We attended the Chicano Art Festival at the University of Northern

Colorado. We gathered many ideas and have become inspired with ideas for future programs in our district.



We attended our quarterly meeting with Comunidad. Colleagues at the Denver Museum of Nature & Science, The Children's Museum of Denver, History Colorado, The Denver Botanic Gardens, Denver public Library, Anythink, and The Denver Art Museum hosted an interactive discussion on translation and bilingual labels. We will incorporate some of their findings and ideas into our programming.

Larimer Disparities Action committee met to discuss prejudice and stereotypes, how to incorporate processes into our practice that promote recognition of unfairness in our society related to the Big 8 and how to empower families to foster fairness and respect for themselves and others.

International Outreach



El Programa Pelicano is being launched at Harris Elementary and San Juan de Dios in Nicaragua. This will be a wonderful opportunity for children to practice writing skills on paper and also in electronic format, to improve literacy, increase awareness of other cultures and lifestyles around the world, and to provide a safe space to create friendships. El Programa Pelicano program will also use a modern variation of the commonly used pen pal program; we will utilize electronic media like Skype and Keypal to communicate.

Computers

During this month we continued with the program Tech a la Carte where we explored and practiced Microsoft Excel in Spanish. A group of people are getting ready to start their own non-profit and they were in great need of learning the use of electronic spreadsheets for storing, organizing and manipulating data that this program offers. We are so glad to say that the Outreach Department of our library can contribute to the success of local organizations.

After meeting with personnel from the Community Life Center, we have dates for Computer Basics for next month. We will have a series of four classes in Spanish and we are very excited to be part of their calendar.

This month we were also invited to promote the Library Services at Crossroads Safehouse to a group of immigrants who didn't know much about our facilities and presence. With the belief that the PRPLD only offered books in English, they were surprised to learn about our many services as well as the diversity of them. After the presentation one member went directly to the Old Town location to check out a Nook for their children to practice the English language. I was also there with our Computer Literacy program and I am glad to say that one participant found a job, another found housing and one more person got accepted for an important workshop thanks to our support there!

Outreach is constantly selecting the best educational apps that reinforce the goals for Early Literacy programs in our programs. We are also in the process of selecting best apps for Summer Reading Program's technology week.

Volunteers

Things are beginning to gear up for getting spring and summer programming support from our volunteers! Barbara Crandall has been setting up the Summer Reading Program registration/ prize desk volunteer shifts for each library and learning about implementing self-scheduling for the SRP volunteers and their SRP training sessions within our Volgistics volunteer management software.

Email messages have gone out to all volunteer applicants to acknowledge receipt of their online applications and to let them know the status of volunteer needs across the Library District. Email recruitment appeals have also gone out to over 50 volunteers and volunteer applicants seeking volunteers to assist Vicky Hays with preparing the books to be given away at the One Book 4 Colorado event.

Barbara Crandall attended the Colorado Council on Volunteerism/Denver DOVIA Symposium, "Creating an Inclusive Program: Engaging Diverse Volunteers," in Westminster, Colorado on March 13. The themes included were LGBTQ and inclusion of people with disabilities in volunteer program.

The local DOVIA meeting was held on March 20, with presenter Carrie Coyne of All Things Volunteers, LLC. Her presentation, titled, "Hanging on to your Most Valuable Asset—Volunteers," touched on having a good foundation—a solid volunteer program, orientation/ training/placements, and recruitment/ retention/recognition, and engaging volunteers in fundraising and advocacy for your organization.


Windows 7 Upgrade

Reference/Teen Services Librarian Sue-Ellen Jones kicked off World Storytelling evening at the Council


Tree Library and told "Abiyoyo" by Pete Seeger. The theme for the storytelling event was monsters and dragons.

At Chris's request, Matt James installed a 4' x 3'plywood board to the back of a cord conduit post in order to protect the post from the crate stacks. Both courier and staff are pleased with the change, since it removes the tripping hazard, provides plenty of space for the daily load of crates, and brings the crates closer to the elevator for the courier.

Currie Attended the Public Library Association's Conference




Along with four other District staff members, I attended PLA's every-other-year national conference from March 12-15. The conference, attended by more than 8,000 library staff and supporters from the US and Canada, was held at the Indianapolis Conference Center in downtown Indianapolis. I had the great privilege of attending informative presentations, hearing inspirational keynote

speakers, and visiting with key library vendors. Memorable keynote speaker Simon Sinek - TED talk "Getting to How" - spoke to us about how primal human behavior shapes

organizational culture. The program "Selling Change Across Your Organization", presented by professionals from Cuyahoga County (OH) PL, showed how deliberate planning and multi-level, multi-modal communication can create an environment where change is not only accepted but understood and appreciated. I also spent time talking with Brainfuse vendors about how their live homework help and tutoring product is working for the District, as well as how they might visit us to provide further training. CTL Library Assistant Karen Cagle and other attended select PLA programs via live internet streaming at Webster House. My District colleagues and I are currently planning ways to collaboratively share the highlights of our conference experiences with staff.

Fire System Tested

Fire systems contractors hired by Front Range Village tested the fire system inside the CTL building from 7:00-9:15 am on March 25. The contractors checked the alarms, strobe lights to heat and smoke. The contractors also checked the elevator system's response to the alarms. When an alarm sounds, both elevator cars should move to the first floor and open doors automatically. They should not respond to calls after that initial systematic response. The system is working properly and passed the test.

Library Tours for Linton Pre-Kindergarten on March 27

Millie Kridler provided 20-minute tours of CTL to two Linton pre-k classes, each with 16 three to 5-year-olds. According to teachers, the goals of the visits included riding the school bus for the first time, riding an elevator for the first time, meeting the librarian, learning where and how to get library cards, and finally, to find where a variety of children's books are located in the library. The groups enjoyed their visits.
